1. COURSE DESCRIPTION & SKILLS GAINED

This Course will focus on preparing you for careers in STEM. As such, there are 4 main outcomes of this class:

- 1. Reflect on personal career goals and hands-on experience
- 2. Produce a digital portfolio
- 3. Produce a scientific CV and personal statement
- 4. Identify career opportunities through a speaker series focused on careers in neuroscience that will be embedded in the course.

3. COURSE OVERVIEW

Career Planning assignments/Speaker Assignments

There will be several assignments that reflect on the speakers and career goals/career plans/career paths. Read these assignments posted on Canvas before coming to class and ensure you are aware of what is being asked of you.

Application Package Assignments

There will be several assignments geared towards polishing the pieces of your applications - CV, personal statement, and interview prep. Read over the assignment instructions posted on Canvas and be sure you are aware of what is being asked of you.

Digital Portfolio

This semester you will create a digital portfolio that will highlight your STEM abilities. Your final portfolio, polished, must include the following:

- 1. Your Scientific CV
- 2. Your polished personal statement
- 3. 2-3 examples of poster presentation (approved by the professors)
- 4. 1-2 examples of scientific writing (approved by the professors)

4. ACADEMIC HONESTY

You are responsible. Review each course syllabus for the professor's expectations regarding course work and class attendance. Violations of the honor code will result from failure of the assignment, failure of the course, to expulsion from the college. You should speak with your professors if you need clarification about any of these policies.

By placing your name on ANY assignment, you are stating that you completed that assignment with academic honesty. Academic dishonesty is reported to medical schools and graduate schools as per their request.

Anyone caught cheating relinquishes the privilege of asking for a letter of recommendation from the professor and will receive a o on the assignment. Acts of academic dishonesty will be turned over to the Honor Court.

<u>Plagiarism:</u> do attribute all ideas taken from other sources; this shows respect for other scholars. Plagiarism can include portraying another's work or ideas as your own, buying a paper online and turning it in as if it were your own work, or not citing or improperly citing references on a reference page or within the text of a paper.

Plagiarism is passing off any work that is not yours as your own work ** EVEN WITH A CITATION***. If you are using a source and citing the source, the information from that source STILL must be reworded in your own voice. Putting a citation behind a statement gives ownership to that source, but, if you do not reword that information, it is plagiarism.

If your answers are not your own, you will receive a o for the assignment. All cases of academic dishonesty will be turned into Honor Court.

<u>Intellectual Fraud:</u> do not falsify or create data and resources or alter a graded work without the prior consent of your professor. This includes making up a reference for a works cited page or making up statistics or facts for academic work.

<u>Cheating:</u> do not allow another party to do your work, or submit the same or similar work in more than one course without permission from the course instructors. Cheating also includes taking another person's website/d-portfolio and passing it off as your own.
